

Air Purifier Information: Grovpure Aspen H13 HEPA Air Purifier

The Grovpure Aspen has 3 stages of filtration: the nylon pre-filter, which captures large particles like animal fur and lint, the activated carbon filter, which absorbs odors and volatile organic compounds, and the true H13 HEPA filter, which traps allergens and other inanimate particles. These stages are incorporated into one easy to replace filter. More information about this model and filter maintenance can be found below.

Tips for Cleaner Air Indoors

If there is an active wildfire nearby or bad air quality, the air is likely hazy and discolored, and your family's health may be at risk. When the air quality reaches 'unhealthy' levels, it's time to prepare your home, or a room in your home, to make sure you can breathe clean air. If you can add a high efficiency filter into your home's ducted HVAC system, that is a good option. If your house is not ducted or you cannot upgrade the filter, portable air cleaners are highly effective. Don't dust or vacuum, and don't burn anything inside to prevent making the air worse.



Whole House Filtration

- 1. **Check your furnace air filter.** A filter rated **MERV 13 or above** will filter out most tiny smoke particles.
- 2. **Keep the fan or air conditioning running recirculated air**. The filter only works when it's on, so keep it running throughout the day/night to move air through the filter. Make sure that there is no external air being brought into the system by running the fan on recirculate, if applicable.
- 3. Check the seals on all doors and windows for leaks. Minimize leaks with towels, caulk, or plastic and tape, and try to only open the doors when needed and close them quickly.

Portable Air Purifiers

- 1. **Identify a room in your house where you can spend most of your time.** This room shouldn't have an exterior door and should be able to be closed off from the rest of the house. This might be a bedroom or den.
- 2. **Set up your air cleaner**. Portable air cleaners need to be in a central place in the room so that it can draw in the most air and filter it quickly. Where's your nearest outlet, and can the device stay there and run all day?
- 3. **Check the seals on your windows.** Do your windows shut tight? If not, use caulk, towels, or a sheet of plastic and some tape to seal up the windows against the smoke.
- 4. **Keep the doors closed**. Minimize how often the exterior doors, and the doors to your clean air room, are opened. This reduces the opportunities for the (invisible) particulates to get into your home and your lungs.
- 5. **Watch for air quality updates.** Check for updates in your community to know if you need to evacuate and how long the smoke may last.
